# Sunday 4th February 2024

#### Call to worship

#### Bible reading: Isaiah 40:21-31

<sup>21</sup> Do you not know? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood since the earth was founded? <sup>22</sup> He sits enthroned above the circle of the earth. and its people are like grasshoppers. He stretches out the heavens like a canopy. and spreads them out like a tent to live in. <sup>23</sup> He brings princes to naught and reduces the rulers of this world to nothing. <sup>24</sup> No sooner are they planted, no sooner are they sown, no sooner do they take root in the ground, than he blows on them and they wither, and a whirlwind sweeps them away like chaff. <sup>25</sup> "To whom will you compare me? #### Reflection

The opening images in today's reading from Isaiah are majestic. God is the one who stretches out the heavens, brings down earthly rulers like stubble in a tempest, creates and numbers the host of stars. They are images of power, but they can make God seem very distant from our everyday lives. If God 'sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers' (Isaiah 40.22) that can make us feel of no more importance than insects. If that was all the passage said about God, then the exiles might well feel abandoned in Babylon – that 'My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God' (verse 27).

But the passage moves on to assure them otherwise. It concludes: 'those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles' (verse 31), an image of humanity soaring to God. That promised renewal of strength is the sign that God, far from

viewing humanity as mere grasshoppers, actually enters into the heart of individuals to give the inner strength to endure. The mighty power, described at the beginning of the reading, is not distant from us, but is ours to draw on in the minutiae of our daily lives.

'Have you not known? Have you not heard?' is repeated like a refrain, giving it a special emphasis (verses 21 and 28). The two questions can appear to be saying the same thing, but 'know' and 'hear' are not identical. 'Have you not heard?' implies that people have shared their experiences. For us to hear of God's power, someone must tell us. Perhaps people have told you personally of the effects God has had in their lives, the evidence they have had that God 'gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless' (verse 29). Perhaps you have read accounts, or listened to people speaking on programmes such as BBC's Songs of Praise.

However, all this is second hand. 'Have you not known?' asks a rather different question. It asks what we have experienced for ourselves of God's power in our lives. Sometimes we have to take the long view to discern it. The Babylonian exile lasted about 60 years and, looking back, the exiles may well have asked themselves how they got through it. Today's passage originates from a period in their exile when the end was in sight, perhaps a time when they could reflect on the faithfulness of the God who had strengthened them for the experience and now offered the hope of mounting on eagles' wings. Perhaps it gives us the opportunity to reflect on our own lives to consider where God has renewed our strength when we felt faint, weary and powerless, or even fell, exhausted on our journey. And if we have stories to tell, then 'Have you not heard?' can encourage us to tell them, because unless we do, others will not hear of God's power in ordinary lives.

#### Elijah Taken Up to Heaven

#### Mark 9:2-9

#### The Transfiguration

<sup>2</sup> After six days Jesus took Peter, James and John with him and led them up a high mountain, where they were all alone. There he was transfigured before them. <sup>3</sup> His clothes became dazzling white, whiter than anyone in the world could bleach them. <sup>4</sup> And there appeared before them Elijah and Moses, who were talking with Jesus.

<sup>5</sup>Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." <sup>6</sup> (He did not know what to say, they were so frightened.)

<sup>7</sup>Then a cloud appeared and covered them, and a voice came from the cloud: "This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!"

#### Reflection

Who doesn't love stories of a brave and tenacious people that takes on a quest or challenge? Often, they involve following a leader in whom everyone puts their trust, but who doesn't always let everyone know exactly what the plan is! There are many real-life stories like this as well. How many adventure films can you think of, or stories you have read, that follow this kind of pattern? Do any of them involve mountains? When Jesus asked Peter, James and John to follow him up 'a high mountain' I wonder how they felt about the invitation. Were they flattered to have been chosen from the 12, or were they apprehensive? We are not told how high the mountain was. If it was Mount Tabor, that's just under 2,000 feet. If it was Mount Hermon - as several scholars think is more likely – that's almost 10,000 feet! Today, we use the phrase, 'they had a mountain to climb' to mean facing a significant challenge. Put together the physical demands of the climb with the fact that in the Jewish imagination going up a mountain was connected with the daunting prospect of an encounter with God, and we can see the chosen three might well have been apprehensive. And when they get to the mountain-top, they do have an experience that leaves them 'terrified'.

One of the attractions of adventure stories where the characters meet a series of challenges is that they make us ask ourselves, 'What would I do in that situation? Would I give up, or would I have the courage to keep going? How far would I want to go? How far would I get?' Only three of the disciples are chosen for the mountain-top challenge and revelation, but we are all called in some way to follow Jesus, not knowing where he will lead but having to trust him. What challenges have you faced so far in the adventure of your discipleship? What are you facing at the moment? Do you have anxieties for the future?

One of the challenges is sharing our experiences with others. Although Peter, James and John were told not to say anything about what happened, that was only until after the resurrection. Then, they must have spread the word or it wouldn't have been written in the Gospel

accounts. Choosing the right people to tell about our experiences with Jesus and the right time, as well as having the courage to do it in the first place, are all challenges in themselves. In our Old Testament reading Elijah offers Elisha escape routes from the demands of their shared vocation as prophets. Elisha's persistence encourages us to risk going on the next stage of our journey of discipleship, and the story of the transfiguration reminds us we have a leader who climbs our mountains with us.

#### Reflection

Noah's ark captures people's imagination as a great escape story.

Having created the world God became very disappointed with the mess human beings made of their appointed task of helping God care for creation. Things were so bad that '...the Lord was sorry that he had made humankind on the earth, and it grieved him to his heart' (Genesis 6:6). So, God has another attempt to form a new creation. This time God uses a tried and tested honourable human, Noah, and two of each type of animal to start again. And we all know the rest of the story. Two of every form of animal get shut up in the ark.

But the ending of the story is amazing, and we often miss this while we are caught up in the drama of the rescue. As the flood subsides, God's love for humans and indeed the whole of God's creation deepens. God's heart is moved – permanently changed. God sees the frailty of humans and compassionately accepts humans as they are in their wonderfulness and messiness all mixed up together. God pledges to love not only humans, but the whole of creation in an unending and steadfast love that will wrap around each person, each family, each tribe, each creature and the whole world, no matter what for ever and ever.

God pledges God's love, as it were, in human sickness and in human health, in human flourishing and in human poverty for ever and ever and ever. The promise goes beyond the death of Noah's generation to include Noah's descendants and on to us and our descendants. And because it is God's, the promise is utterly reliable.

Take a moment to breathe deeply and to feel the reassurance that this promised love gives you: a love that will be with you, all those you love and all of us through thick and thin. Perhaps the most remarkable aspect of this promise is that it is unconditional. It is almost as if God knows we are not up to reciprocating the promise. Some days we might be up to it a bit, and other days completely miss it. But God guarantees to pick up the slack when we miss the mark. The beauty of this promise is reflected in the beauty of the rainbow – a radiant cosmic smile holding together in its image light, warmth and water – essential elements to sustain the life of the universe.

#### **Prayers of intercession**

# Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> February 2024

#### A gathering prayer

We imagine God's plan for us — our ideas of what a happy future looks like, for us, for our family, for our community, for the world. It will bring success, and joy, glory and praise. But will it? Often things turn upside down, we lose control, there are unexpected consequences. God invites us to learn to trust without clear seeing; only later do we recognise God's goodness to us.

#### Bible readings: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

#### The Covenant of Circumcision

**17** When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the LORD appeared to him and said, "I am God Almighty; walk before me faithfully and be blameless. <sup>2</sup> Then I will make my covenant between me and you and will greatly increase your numbers."

<sup>3</sup> Abram fell facedown, and God said to him, <sup>4</sup> "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You will be the father of many nations. <sup>5</sup> No longer will you be called Abram; your name will be Abraham, for I have made you a father of many nations. <sup>6</sup> I will make you very fruitful; I will make nations of you, and kings will come from you. <sup>7</sup> I will establish my covenant as an everlasting covenant between me and you and your descendants after you for the generations to come, to be your God and the God of your descendants after you.

<sup>15</sup> God also said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you are no longer to call her Sarai; her name will be Sarah. <sup>16</sup> I will bless her and will surely give you a son by her. I will bless her so that she will be the mother of nations; kings of peoples will come from her."

#### Mark 8:31-38

#### Jesus Predicts His Death

<sup>31</sup> He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. <sup>32</sup> He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him.

<sup>33</sup> But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. "Get behind me, Satan!" he said. "You do not have in mind the concerns of God, but merely human concerns."

#### The Way of the Cross

<sup>34</sup> Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. <sup>35</sup> For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it. <sup>36</sup> What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? <sup>37</sup> Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul? <sup>38</sup> If anyone is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of them when he comes in his Father's glory with the holy angels."

#### Reflection

In his book Falling Upward, Richard Rohr illuminates one of life's profound mysteries. Somehow our failing can be the foundation for our ongoing spiritual growth. In the first half of life, those who have fallen, failed or 'gone down', seem to be the only ones who understand 'up'. The heartbreaks, disappointments and loves of the first half of life are stepping stones to the spiritual joys that the second half has in store for us. The stories of Abram, Sarai – and Peter – perhaps illustrate this. In this week's reading Sarai, Abram's wife, was 90 years old. A huge disappointment in her life was that she had no children. The sign of God's blessing of an expanding clan and tribe had eluded her. She had adventured through life with Abram. When he was 70 and she 61 they had been called by God to leave their homeland in Haran and travel to a

'promised land' in which God would make of them a great nation. But, nearly 30 years later, Sarai was still childless.

It did not look promising. And yet in today's reading the promise is made again. God's ideas of timing and human ideas of timing often don't tie up. In the next passage when Sarah hears the news she laughs because she doesn't believe it! When Abram hears the news from God, and God's desire for a covenant between them in which they pledge faithfulness to one another, his response is to fall on his face. Maybe it took Abram 30 years to learn to trust God, even when he doesn't understand. He has learnt to trust him through several disasters in life and, in the end, he has just learnt to trust, no matter what.

And what about Peter? In this week's story he is perhaps in what Richard Rohr calls the 'first half of life'. Just before this passage he has had a wonderful spiritual breakthrough. He is the first person to publicly declare that he recognises that Jesus is the promised Messiah. If we put ourselves in Peter's shoes, he must have been euphoric. As if the scales have fallen from his eyes. He has named a realisation that has been creeping up on him for some time. Wow! Imagine the spiritual high. But then immediately, he falls into complete confusion. Jesus begins to talk about the suffering and death of the Messiah. Peter's reaction is 'what on earth is he talking about'. He must stop talking this way, or he will put people off. He tries to stop Jesus and is rebuked in unbelievably strong terms. 'Get behind me, Satan'.

Like most of us, Peter will turn out to be a very slow learner. He will go on to make some horrific mistakes, such as denying he even knows who Jesus is; and going back on his promise to unconditionally baptize Gentiles. And yet despite, and maybe because of, his failures Jesus sees that he has the gifts to be the rock on which Christ's church can be built.

The takeaway for us is perhaps to re-evaluate our failures, disappointments, hurts and see that in the wondrous grace of God, God can use what can feel like big difficulties to help us to learn to trust God even when we don't understand.
